NOTES: The Housing Element ensures that San Francisco will have enough capacity to produce the number of housing units by income level prescribed by the Bay Area Association of Governments (ABAG) through the Regional Housing Need Allocation (RHNA). State Law requires that the Housing Element address, remove, or mitigate governmental and non-governmental constraints to housing production. In addition, the Housing Element is required to include policies that serve to provide: equal housing opportunities for San Francisco residents, assist in the development of housing, improve and conserve existing housing stock, preserve units at-risk of conversion from affordable to market rate, The Housing Element relies on robust public outreach and engagement to develop the policies and implementation programs that express San Francisco's housing priorities over the next eight years. This extensive outreach is supplemented with data analysis of San Francisco's housing trends and pressing housing needs, a site inventory analysis, and an evaluation of the implementing programs from the previous Housing Element.

NOTES: The SFMTA is proposing to include specific streets in the Bayview in the Slow Streets program. Please use this survey to provide feedback on the program and the proposal for the Bayview. Slow Streets are residential streets where the roadway is shared between people exercising or traveling by foot or bike and cars. Slow Streets restrict access to only local traffic (cars going to or coming from the block), emergency vehicles, and mail/delivery vehicles. Signage is also installed to discourage unsafe speeds and warn motorists of the possible presence of people walking, running, or biking in the roadway. The SFMTA implemented temporary Slow Streets on a number of residential corridors throughout the city as a response to the COVID-19. Slow Streets provide more space for physically distanced walking and rolling. There are no impacts to parking on residential streets and the designation is temporary until the end of San Francisco's emergency health order related to COVID-19.
